Council

Parkdale Council had a very busy year to fulfill some of the recommendations from the Strategic Plan that were approved in 2022.

Council did have a busy year; we moved ahead with the repurposing of the stage in the sanctuary, found a long-term renter for our daycare space in the lower east side of our building, Mosaic Montessori, who are now moved in. Our building is abuzz all week long. A special thank you to Parkdale United Church (Calgary) Foundation for the financial support given to the church to help make these two projects happen. Both of these projects were recommendations from the Strategic Planning Committee's work done in 2022.

Below is a brief outline of the work of council in 2023:

- Approving the 2023 budget and reviewing the monthly financial statements of the church
- We facilitated a stewardship campaign during Lent 2023, with the theme of gratitude to the people of Parkdale United Church who generously give their time, talent, and treasure to keep our ministry alive.
- In January, we started the process of understanding what needed to be done to make our space more usable to outside groups. With the help of a lunch on January 15, 2023, where the congregation did some brainstorming, it was decided that the first step in repurposing our space was to renovate the stage in the sanctuary. This work was completed in the summer of 2023, guided by a team of volunteers led by Ken Coburn.

- With the work of Sandy Navrady and Rev. Kim Holmes-Younger and their team, we were able to find a long-term partner for our daycare space, Mosaic Montessori.
- Council offered a variety of ways to build community within our congregation: we hosted Shrove Tuesday, offered soup and bun lunches, had our September Sunday Sundae welcome back, hosted our annual picnic, and, of course, hosted our Christmas Craft and supper night, which, is always well attended and appreciated by all.
- Approved the plan of having a Garage Sale in May 2023.
- We discussed where our Sunday School should best relocate once the daycare space was leased and agreed to move them up to the second floor, which has been very successful. Our Sunday School continues to grow, which is such a blessing. A special thank you to Letitia Berger for her leadership with our school-age children, as well as a thank you to Serena Cole for helping out. Emily Flood looks after our children under 5, and they all love her; she is such a shining light for these little ones.
- The Embaie refugee group has continued to arrive; only two people are now here. Parkdale was a co-sponsor with Michael Embaie's group to help them bring six or seven family members to Canada. We were able to help the process through the United Church of Canada Refugee support group. The Michael Embaie group put in trust with us the cost to have these family members come.
- In partnership with Parkdale Nifty Fifties (at Parkdale Community Center), we looked into offering a fitness program for seniors with mobility issues who still live in their own homes. We applied for a United Church of Canada Foundation grant to help fund this program, and in September 2023, Fit and Friendship was up and running. Thanks to all who have taken the time to host this group for friendship after their fitness time is complete. The group was tiny initially but has grown, and we are now looking at a second time in the week for the fitness part of the program, which will benefit these seniors.
- We planned a welcome parking lot party for the Mosaic Montessori families in September 2023. It was well attended and allowed the families to see where their children would come once the space was ready for occupancy.
- We investigated hosting a one-week summer camp with Camp Caravan, but it did not happen due to a lack of registration. Camp Caravan is a program offered by Fish Creek shared ministries throughout our Region.
- Council created and approved a Behavioral Covenant that will be presented at the AGM. Most United Churches have this type of covenant document

which guides us in how to treat and respect people as we do our ministry at Parkdale. More will be said about this document at the AGM.

- A new team was created to look at our sound system in the sanctuary, and we started the fundraising for this project, kicking it off with Oktoberfest, which was a huge success, thanks to the work of hosting it by Rev. Kim and her family and Lee Morris.
- Our council looked at Remit 1 from the National Church to establish an Autonomous National Indigenous Structure within the United Church of Canada. Council voted unanimously in favor of this remit. If you wish to learn more about this remit, please go to the United Church of Canada website.
- Council is just starting to work on a policy to help our webmaster, Beth Balshaw, learn what items to advertise on the website versus what might just be noted on the calendar.
- One of the next steps in the Strategic Plan is to examine how we can engage performing arts groups to use our space. We did have a test run in December and January when an agent who supports Folk Music rented our sanctuary for two different concerts. Parkdale hosted a concession stand at these two concerts and felt the events were quite successful. This work is ongoing as we hope to make our sanctuary busy, not just on Sundays.

As you can see, we were swamped and continue to be busy looking at our church's needs and how we can move forward to be a vital space in the wider community. We look forward to many conversations, workshops, etc., to keep you, the congregation, involved in our church's ministry and mission. A special thank you to all council members and other volunteers from our congregation who helped make 2023 a successful year.

Stage Repurposing Committee

The Stage Re-Purposing Task Group comprised Ken Coburn, Nick Finn, Wayne Flood, and Rev. Kim Holmes-Younger. The Project was identified as a priority in Parkdale's Strategic Short-Term Plan and informed by several consultations with the Congregation.

Following was the intended scope of the project:

A general contractor completed the following:

- 1. Remove carpet in stage and steps
- 2. Disconnect existing wiring/sound cables in stub wall and organ pit
- 3. Subcontract journeyman electrician to relocate electrical items
- 4. Remove stub wall in stage
- 5. Frame in organ pit to be even with stage floor
- 6. Remove choir risers at back of stage
- 7. Extend steps approx. 6 feet on either side of existing
- 8. Relocate the stair railings and newel posts
- 9. Remove existing boxes on top of former planter area
- 10. Amend two planter box tops to be flush
- 11. Paint planter areas
- 12. Remove and discard lectern.

The following were necessary items identified during execution and additional to the intended scope of the project:

- 1. Our mechanical contractor replaced the two south-wall heating units with a single thermostatically-controlled slant-fin baseboard heater.
- 2. A new sub-floor was needed beneath the old choir risers.
- 3. Two stage pockets were installed, consistent with the anticipated soundsystem improvement project, as this just made sense given the stage work being done.
- 4. Organ speaker cabling needed to be spliced as several cables were not long enough to accommodate the organ's new location.
- 5. Re-locating the organ required more electrical labour than anticipated.

The project began after an early July wedding and was completed by Labour Day. Council approved a budget of \$25,000 for the project, and the final costs were slightly over budget. A donor from the congregation provided a portion of the funds for the project, and the Parkdale United Church (Calgary) Foundation provided the remainder.

Operations Committee

The Operations Committee generally meets on the second Wednesday of each month (except July and August) and is responsible for caring for the Congregation's physical and financial assets. Continuously, the committee reviews and executes building and equipment maintenance, reviews and approves building use by outside groups, reviews financial statements, receives income and pays expenses, supervises the caretaker, and counts and deposits the weekly offering. Other notable projects are undertaken as necessary.

The Operations Committee members are Sherry Anderson-Kepke (the church's bookkeeper), Ken Coburn, Wayne Flood, Rev. Kim Holmes-Younger, Kim Leong, and George Norton. Colin Redekop, our Office Administrator, is an essential Operations team member and attends our meetings. Please consider joining the Operations Committee, as we are looking for additional members. We are a fun-loving and friendly bunch!!

Our Caretaker is Hector Renderos, and he attends our meetings as his schedule permits.

We also thank Jim Balshaw, who helps with "electronics projects," and Helen Heacock and Bill Crabbe, who are assisted by other volunteer gardeners who steward the garden.

Post-pandemic building-use revenues have increased but have not yet reached prepandemic levels. The Parkdale Mosaic Montessori preschool is now up and running, significantly increasing our revenue. Renting parking stalls on weekdays is another significant source of income. Building-use revenue for 2024 is budgeted to be \$132,000, 10% above pre-pandemic levels, with upside potential.

During 2023, the Operations Committee undertook or oversaw several projects, the most notable being the following:

- All of the fire extinguishers in the building were replaced as they "aged out" from regulatory compliance,
- Approved increasing the number of parking stalls for rent to 25,
- Supported the PUC Strategic Short-Term Plan by offering experience with building use and building systems, specifically in getting Parkdale Mosaic Montessori in and repurposing the stage,
- Approved leasing a new Canon office printer/copier and
- Completed numerous minor maintenance projects, replacing many fluorescent light ballasts, repairing drywall damage, and painting.

We thank the congregation for its generosity and its continuing support for the ministries of Parkdale United Church.

Foundation

For 2023, the Directors of the Parkdale United Church (Calgary) Foundation were Jim Balshaw (Chair), Nick Finn (Vice Chair), Sue Brodrick (Secretary), Gordon Thomson (Treasurer), Sheila Campbell, and Ken Coburn.

In 2023, the Foundation's primary activity was managing its investments, which totaled \$424,575 at year-end. We also had professional fees and administration costs (office, printing, and postage) totaling \$817.

In 2023, the Foundation paid \$40,000 from the Mary Fund to Parkdale United Church to support their Operating Expenses at the request of the church council, which was struggling from COVID-19 decreases in revenue.

The Foundation contributed \$15,000 towards the Stage Repurposing Project.

Two of our projectors on the east side of the sanctuary reached the end of their life, and the projector communication system died and needed replacing. The Foundation paid \$9,854 to replace this video equipment. We were blessed that this type of expenditure was precisely what the money donated to the Foundation by the Estate of Lawrie and Berta Fisher would love. Perhaps, in 2024, some more funds will be used towards a new sound system, which is in the works.

In 2023, Parkdale United Church (PUC) obtained a long-term preschool partner in the lower east side of the church. This tenant leased the space with the understanding that PUC was responsible for the cost of upgrading the building to meet current codes. When the tenant applied for their development permit to make some changes in the space, it was discovered that three items did not meet the current code from the City of Calgary. The PUC Council was made aware of this.

In 2023, the PUC Council requested the Foundation transfer from the Parkdale United Church (Calgary) Foundation \$14,283 for HVAC upgrades and automated doors near the elevators for people with special needs. The Foundation also paid \$19,086 for upgrading the total building fire alarm panel and strobe lights, along with \$9.853 for preliminary expenses incurred to secure a new tenant.

The Foundation Directors met two times in 2023 to do the work required of the Foundation and prepare for the Annual General Meeting.

A special thank you to Gordon Thomson for his work as treasurer. He stays on top of the investments, renews them when they mature, or moves them to other investment vehicles to create good value on all our investments.

At the 2023 AGM, which will be held this spring of 2024, following a church service, one new board member will be elected, and retiring board member Sheila Campbell will be recognized.

Environmental Justice

• PUC hosted a program called **Mending our Earth in June** 2023, and we were pleased to have many members of the Parkdale community join us. Presentations

by David Kelly (CEO of Skyfire) on solar panel options and Jim Balshaw on Parkdale's solar and boiler projects inspired others.

- We received national recognition from Faithful Footprints for our projects, and we continue to be available for inquiries and help. We have a presentation with Faithful Footprints (a National Decarbonization Strategy for UC information) ready for 2024, time permitting.
- **100 Mile Lunch:** Our potluck encouraged people to buy locally for the food shared. The question was what do you think the impact of changing food habits might be on our earth's environment?
- Sale of Fair-trade Coffee, soaps, and shampoo continues to advocate for "greening" our environment and reducing the use of plastics. So far, Notice Hair has diverted 8,402,552 plastic bottles, and Tru Earth laundry strips have diverted 160,000,000 plastic bottles. Thanks for your help with this vital work!

Social Justice

- **Band-Aid (KAIROS Affordable Housing)** has existed by **building links** with other faith groups and community support. We adapt and do what our heart tells us to do. Sometimes, it provides the necessities to make a new start (a bed, sheets, dishes, towels). Sometimes, it is a piece of soapstone or art supplies for therapy. Most of the time, we have used donations, but for others, we require a little cash to supplement our support. The community also supports us. Tip Top Soil shares soil for the building's gardens for vegetables and flowers. Strangers have helped residents learn to garden! Eleanor Halton shares her garage for donations "in waiting."
- **Bread** is picked up from several city-wide COBS Bakeries and delivered to the KAIROS housing buildings every week. Could you help us occasionally with this work?
- The annual KAIROS/CUPS Christmas Party at McDougall United Church was the biggest year ever for attendance and needs. A Band-Aid partner (Banff Trail Square Dancers) shared 60 gifts and \$430, while Parkdale contributed 70 gifts and \$300. Parkdale members helped with the party and had fun, too. Thank you.

- The KAIROS Affordable Housing (A Place to Call Home) spring walk raised \$25,000 for the Bankview Mortgage.
- PUC has supported Morley, AVENUE 15, and the Calgary Pride event.
- **Sunday Night Movies.** We have enjoyed the movies shared during the year and the very thoughtful discussions after each one. We are sorry to have had trouble sourcing the film recently. We hope to overcome this problem and encourage community attendance in the future. Parkdale gave a presentation about our solar and BAND-AID programs at the request of the Calgary Alliance for the Common Good and a KAIROS Prairies North meeting.

Ploughshares Calgary Society: Ploughshare is grateful to Parkdale for the support it offers to its work. They bring monthly Peace Education presentations such as Women as Peacebuilders, Non-Killing Political Science, Spirituality and the Environment, and Youth & Restorative Justice.

- In response to the Ukraine/Russia conflict, Ploughshares shared a video of the national "Peace Table,' they were sent to Government officials with a call for a ceasefire.
- Project Ploughshares Calgary has produced monthly Zoom educational gatherings with excellent information.
- Bev Delong shared an educational evening at Parkdale, addressing the topic of **Nuclear Abolition and Peace Making.**

Refugee Sponsorship Program

Since 2018, Parkdale has worked with Michael Embaie to co-sponsor seven Eritreans to Calgary. Four of them are now here, and the remaining three (dependents of one of the men already here) will come through family sponsorship, a process that doesn't require Parkdale's involvement. Our commitment to this co-sponsorship will end in October 2024.

In 2020, Parkdale applied to sponsor the husband of one of the women we sponsored in 2015. We have recently been informed by IRCC that our application is entering the final stages of the approval process. Our hope is for good news in the coming months. Once

we know for certain that he is coming, we will begin fundraising (approximately \$18,000) to fulfill our commitment to support him during his first year here.
